
Dear Friends,




Race




Gender

The Excel Center® Meets Students Where They Are in Life

The Excel Center provides adults age 19 and older an opportunity to earn a high school diploma. Students also develop career paths offering greater employment and growth opportunities.

Avery graduated in June 2019 and is working in Goodwill's IT department. He plans to attend college to study web design. His experience was difficult – like many of the more than 300,000 adults in Arkansas who don't have a high school diploma.

After the death of his sister when Avery was a teen, he turned to gangs. He was later shot in a parking lot and left paralyzed. He believes, "It's part of the journey that brought me back to reality and my family's values."

While Avery learned to live life as a paraplegic, his girlfriend Gina told him about The Excel Center. Avery remembered a promise to his mother, "I told her I would finish high school."

He considers his life coach Courtney "the Band-Aid and Neosporin of life." He adds, "I can text her anytime. Her advice and support really helped get me through the tough and rough days."

Expanding Our Footprint and Improving Our Service

Goodwill will expand The Excel Center, offering adults outside Central Arkansas access to education and better jobs. Brian F. Marsh, President and CEO notes, “Operational costs for The Excel Center are currently funded 100% by the sale of donated merchandise at our stores.”

Last year, 217 students enrolled in the adult high school. The school opened in October 2017, and since then 24 students have graduated.

Individuals who graduate from high school can expect to make an average of \$10,000 more annually than those who do not graduate.

We added a Goodwill Resource Center (GRC) in Rogers, an Attended Donation Center (ADC) in Centerton and relocated our El Dorado store. This was part of our strategic plan to better serve donors with convenient locations, shoppers with a better shopping experience and expand programs and services in underserved areas. The Rogers GRC, like the GRC in Little Rock, houses an outlet where shoppers can buy textiles by the pound. A free career center helps anyone, especially those with barriers to employment, find good jobs to support themselves and their families. Our ADC in Centerton has quickly proven to be convenient for our donors. Our former El Dorado Goodwill store moved to a larger location which now includes a career center.



Reentry Program Provides Second Chances

In 2008, while in an abusive relationship, Brenda started using Oxycodone. Her addiction escalated. She dealt the drugs she used. After multiple arrests, she began residential treatment. She ran away, broke into a home and stole a gun. Brenda stole medication and was arrested again. She was incarcerated, with release to Washington County Drug Court, and then detoxed in county jail.

During this time, Brenda met several women who changed her life path. Goodwill's Reentry Manager Marty Hausam, the women of Narcotics Anonymous and Washington County Drug Court Judge Cristi Beaumont helped Brenda on the road to her recovery.

She was released and accepted into Goodwill's Reentry Program. The path wasn't easy. She completed 30 days of inpatient treatment, changing her people, places and things. She worked hard and found her passion; helping people returning from incarceration.

Brenda has regained her life, family, home, a new car, and is at peace. Her recovery requires daily maintenance. She says, "It takes an army to help even one addict stay clean. Thank you Goodwill for my second chance."

The Academy at Goodwill

The Academy at Goodwill helps Arkansans obtain employment, advance their careers and learn valuable skills. The Academy added a welding program in partnership with the Metropolitan Career-Technical Center, First Aid, CPR, AED and Mental Health First Aid certification.


According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness, each year one in five Americans will experience mental illness. Recognizing the impact on Arkansans, Goodwill Industries of Arkansas began offering a Mental Health First Aid class in May 2019. The course helps participants recognize the signs of mental illness and substance abuse, learn how to interact with someone in a mental health crisis and help connect them with resources.

“So many struggle in silence because they don’t feel they can reach out for help,” said Goodwill’s Brandi Alcacio. “On average, people delay getting treatment for 10 years. Mental Health First Aid training should be as common as CPR.”

Alcacio is the third Arkansan certified by the National Council for Behavioral Health.

Kaizen: Streamlining Processes Helps Us Work Smarter

Kaizen training—from the Japanese word meaning “change for the better,” provides a clean, organized work environment for our employees. It streamlines the production process, helping employees get product to the retail floor more quickly. Kaizen is a data-based methodology that improves efficiency through the streamlining of storage, in store processes and transportation. Kaizen works because frontline employees who are closest to the process provide real-life, real-time solutions and sustainable changes.

“This process has made me feel very proud,” Ruh Quaye, Retail Associate at our Markham Park store says, “I no longer feel like I work in a warehouse. Now it is like an office to me! Kaizen changes will make good money for us and help us move forward with our mission!”

Kaizen has increased average daily sales by 6.24%. The true impact, is reduced employee turnover, improved employee satisfaction and better donor and shopper experiences!
